<u>Conservative Management of Localized Prostate Cancer</u> (Includes Active Surveillance Vs. Watchful Waiting)"

In his talk Dr. Andrew Loblaw covered several topics of direct interest to our members:

- Understanding the philosophy and outcomes for patients managed with Active Surveillance
- Reviewing treatment options for men with localized prostate cancer
- Understanding the rationale and opportunity of shorter radiation treatments using higher doses per day (hypo fractionation)
- Reviewing salvage therapies in particular androgen deprivation therapy.

It has taken a while to obtain the PSA results from Dr. Stanley Flax as he has been busy moving into his new facility. Here are the numbers:

- Blood was drawn from 136 men, but 5 of them could not supply valid physician information
- Of the 131 samples that were processed, 17 yielded elevated PSA scores, from 3+ to 28+. Hopefully we opened a few eyes on September 1st.

The members of the Steering Committee have approved The Second Annual Cruisin' for a Cure Canada, to be held in September, 2008. The actual date will be September 6 or September 13. We will once again use Chinguacousy Park. We could never find a finer facility than "Ching" or a better group of people to work with than Harvey Newlove, Rob Gasper and all the Ching park staff.
