PCCN Conference - September 22nd - 25th In Toronto

We had a very successful Conference held at the Fairmount Royal York Hotel in Toronto hosted by the movement known as Movember. Movember, the month formerly known as November, raises Funds for Research and Awareness as well as all Men's Health Issues.

The Conference had an opening Reception and Dinner on Wednesday evening with Aaron Bacher's, (the Conference Chairman), opening remarks and his introduction to the nights speaker. We were introduced to W. Brett Wilson (of Dragon's Den Fame) and Brett related his journey through his Prostate Cancer treatments and trials, a most enlightening personal talk of one man's tribulations. There was humour and honesty in his "off the cuff" words without an apparent written speech to refer to.

On Thursday our day began with a Medical Update by Dr. Robert G. Bristow who gave us a brief outline of the latest information on how Toronto is in the forefront on several areas, including the Gnome identification of the various Prostate Cancers.

We had the pleasure of hearing from "The Horse's Mouth" (Adam Garone, the Co-Founder of Movember) as to how Movember began in 2003 in Australia in a bar and several rounds of the "bubbly brew" and how it grew to raising over \$100 Million in 9 years for Prostate Cancer and related men's issues. Canada raised the second largest amount last year of \$7.8 Million. It was very interesting how a bunch of "Aussies" started a worldwide phenomenon that is devoted to Awareness and Funding Research into Prostate Cancer as well as other men's issues.

Gerald McGroarty took us through the value of Branding and how a Brand has a tendency to influence pro or con reactions on your decision to accept or reject it. Several comparisons were given as to corporations and individuals for your reaction such as McDonald's, Tim Horton's, Cassius Clay (Mohamed Ali), and Donald Trump. It was pointed out that most "Brands" have a Mission Statement, are consistent, know their customers and are committed to positive Brand experience and their Core values. Gerald also pointed out how easy it was to lose that confidence. BP Oil and Tiger Woods are good examples of veering off from your "Mission Statement". Some expressions or sayings that hit home were:

"People don't care about how much you know unless they know how much you care"

"The toes you step on today might be connected to the ass you've got to kiss tomorrow"

"It can take years to build your brand but seconds to ruin it"

"The most important brand ever created is You"

"None of us is smarter than all of us"

Thursday afternoon was spent in another Team Building Workshop where we were asked to relate how our individual Groups performed or could improve. It was highlighted around a discussion of "Set Your Own Agenda". It was based on discussing amongst each table how to Contribute Openly, Give Freely of your Experience, Listen Hard, Confine your Discussion and only One Conversation at a Time. It was pointed out that Goodwill and the presumption of Goodwill in others is very important. A Discussion Planning session ensued for the Best Ideas in the various Groups and to give advice to PCCN/PCC Staff and Advisory Board.

Thursday evening we had a very pleasant Mariposa Dinner Boat Cruise around the Toronto Waterfront.

Friday morning Elizabeth M. Priestman introduced us to how the media and how modern computers and devices are rapidly changing our interface. We were shown just how changing the words have become and the shortening of words has become. Such as "USC - user generated content", "RSS - really simple syndicate", "Blog - a shared online journal" and the Oxford American Dictionary "word of the year" - " Unfriend ".

Our luncheon speaker was known to most of us for his appearances on TV and his books. Dr. Robert Buckman and his talk " Laughter the Second Best Medicine". It was as he suggested very humorous and enjoyable.

After lunch the groups broke out into three separate sessions, "Women and Prostate Cancer", "Setting up a Support Group for Advanced Prostate Cancer" and "Men's Social" with Mike Pelyk and Walt McKechnie.

The Group I chose was the Advance Prostate Cancer Group and we had a very excellent discussion how to Start a group and what the Goals should be. We were given information of the Warriors Group in Calgary and an agenda of one of their meetings. The Warriors were formed in 2005 as an adjunct to the PCCN-Calgary Group known then as Prostaid Calgary. It was so intriguing that a Group of us met after the adjournment for the day to continue discussing other related matters.

On Saturday Dr. Trachtenburg, or Trachi as he is known to most of us, spoke to us about his "Recent Research and Medical Advances" on Trials for newly diagnosed PCa patients. It is Focal Therapy or as he called it "Guided Focal Ablation" whereby "Low Grade" PCa patients are given this treatment on a "Out Patient Basis". The results have been nearly 95% curative with no side effects of the radiation. As Dr T quoted Dr Bernard:

" There is no such thing as incurable, it only means that no cure has been found".

Dr T mentioned two other new drugs coming onto the scene are "Ketoconazole" and "Abiraterone" which have had very favourable results.

The rest of the morning was spent on Concluding the Team Building Session and the Wrapping Up the very successful PCCN Conference.

We were assured that all the delegates would receive a summation of the Conference at a reasonably sooner rather than later date.

Report on 4th Annual Cruisin' for a Cure – Sunday, September 12

This year's show suffered a little due to very unsettled weather, which kept away vehicles coming from more distant points, and to our change in venue from Chinguacousy Park to the Powerade Centre.

Nonetheless, we welcomed 260+ vehicles and the crew of phlebotomists from LifeLabs drew 241 vials of blood. 44 of the men tested – more than 18% – were advised to seek further diagnosis.

This year's most significant development was that our friends at *Prostate Cancer Canada* stepped in and arranged a restricted educational grant from *GlaxoSmithKline Inc.* to help cover the cost of providing the PSA tests. Prostate Cancer Canada is also helping to cover the rest of the testing costs.

As usual, this event would not have happened without the generous support of our members, friends and sponsors. My wife *Sandi* is my right hand and my brains throughout the year; without her, nothing at all would happen!

Throughout the year, the members of the Steering Committee and their spouses are always available to us, especially *Margaret & Sean Butterly*, *Gary & Marie Foote*, *Paul Henshall*, *Al*

Hutton, Steve & Mary Hutton, Mike Loughnan, Tilly Netherton, Denis & Jean Paris and Morris Rambout.

Every year, we receive strong support from members of the Chrysler PT Cruiser Community. *Rick & Elaine Brown*, *Max & Debbie Gabriel* and *Jim & Caroline Winner* represented the Chrysler Cruising Club of Western New York this year. All the proceeds from their efforts went to Cruisin' for a Cure.

Of special note, our DJ, Bob McKerron of KRUZ Radio, was there bright and early and kept us entertained all day long. Sadly, Bob used this occasion to announce that he is retiring for personal and health reasons. He was the first person who took us seriously when Sandi & I started planning the first Cruisin' for a Cure Canada. Bob's advice and support have been invaluable; we will miss him greatly.

Finances were handled by *Gary Foote*, *Mary Hutton* and *Denis Paris*. Final numbers are not officially available as there are pledges still outstanding.

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What I Did This Summer or "A Few Months in the Life of a PCa Advocate"

Since I decided to retire from my part-time consulting practice after dealing with cardiac disease, my life has not been my own. There is so much to do out there to end ignorance about Prostate Cancer. Happily, I am finding out that there many new avenues opening up for advocacy. Here are a few of the more exciting things that I have discovered.

Years ago, Fred Norris suggested that we find a source for the blue ribbon lapel pins that had become a standard awareness item. I found www.pcaawareness.net and got to know Richard L. Ward, a pioneer advocate who was instrumental in making the blue ribbon the symbol for Prostate Cancer and in having September declared Prostate Cancer Awareness Month in many of the United States.

Rick set up the pins mission to ensure that high quality blue ribbon lapel pins would be available to anybody who needed it at a reasonable price. There was no profit involved as Rick kept prices very low and funded the operation out of his retirement income. He got me interested in Cruisin' for a Cure and then introduced me to Debbie Baker and you know the rest of that story.

When Rick learned that his days were numbered due to complications from his own Prostate Cancer and from his military service, his main concern was that his personal mission not die with him. Since he could not find anybody else, I teamed up with Rick Brown from the Chrysler Cruising Club of Western New York and we moved the operation from San Antonio to Lewiston, NY in June, 2009. Rick Ward passed away quietly on August 29 and is greatly missed by many friends around the world.

Since that time, Rick Brown and I have sold over 100,000 lapel pins, wristbands and car magnets to customers all over the world. In the process, we have gotten to know some very special individuals, ranging from kids hurting over the loss of a loved one to health care professionals.

One of our regular customers is Dr. Levi Ross from Roswell Park Cancer Institute in Buffalo.

MAN UP

On June 16, Elaine Brown and I attended a press conference at Roswell park at Dr. Ross's invitation. We were invited both because we had sold him the lapel pins being handed out at the launch and because Levi wanted to stage a small car show in connection with the press release so we brought some PT Cruisers along. The show was rained out but the press conference went ahead.

This conference announced the creation of a new advocacy group, *Minorities Allied for the Need to Understand Prostate Cancer* or *MAN UP*. This group is supported by Roswell Park and in fact a number of Roswell Park staff are members of the group. Members are both PCa survivors and interested men. Elaine and I were impressed by the enthusiasm and eloquence of all the members that we met at the conference.

They work with churches throughout the Buffalo area to increase awareness of the special dangers that Prostate Cancer poses for African-American men, whose chances of being diagnosed with Prostate Cancer are 1.6 times as great as for Caucasian men. Once diagnosed, African-American men are 2.5 times as likely to die of Prostate Cancer.

Fred Norris and other members of Us TOO Brampton recognized this disparity very early on and sought to reach out to the Canadian Black community, without much success. Hopefully, our involvement with MAN UP will help as they have offered to come to Brampton to speak to us and to churches in our area. One of their members is *Charlie Ferguson*, an NFL legend and noted public speaker.

Interestingly, Steve Jones and Helene Vassos of PCC have already been speaking with another group in the Brampton area and hopefully PCCN – Brampton will get involved as well.

Cruisin' for a Cure Buffalo

On August 25, Sandi & I met with Levi Ross and Terry Alford at Roswell Park to discuss holding a Cruisin' for a Cure event in Buffalo in September, 2011.

We all came away determined to make this happen on a different weekend from our own 5th Annual Cruisin' for a Cure Canada. The tentative location is The Buffalo Transportation Pierce Arrow Museum in downtown Buffalo as suggested by Terry Alford.

We have been promised support by MAN UP and by members of the Chrysler Cruising Club of Western New York.

On September 12, Dr. Ross and his intern, Jarrett Johnson, took time out from a busy weekend of awareness events in Buffalo to drive up and spend the morning at our Cruisin' for a Cure. They went away suitably impressed.

PHEN 6th Annual African-American Prostate Cancer Disparity Summit

I attended this conference in Washington, DC as a guest of Roswell Park Cancer Institute, one of the Summit sponsors. PHEN is the Prostate Health Education Network and it works in the African-American community to address its special concerns.

The PHEN Summit was just one of many Prostate Cancer events being held in Washington during the "Advance on Washington", organized by the major Prostate Cancer organizations in the United States. As a press release on the Prostate Cancer Foundation website stated:

Charlie Wilson, Jean Fogelberg and Rosey Grier Join "Advance on Washington" to Improve Treatments, Reduce Overtreatment

Washington, DC, September 14, 2010 — With \$3 billion spent on the over-treatment of prostate cancer each year, new discoveries are prompting the prostate cancer community to Advance on Washington the week of September 13 – 18. This initiative calls for renewed commitments to finding answers that will enable physicians to cure more and over-treat less. The nation's leading prostate

cancer organizations today issued a five point plan, targeted to policymakers, to accelerate research and discovery of effective prostate cancer treatments.

While I was hesitant to attend the PHEN Summit, being uncertain that a 'honkie' could contribute much to their difficult task, I found it to be a very valuable experience. First, I got to spend four days with most of the members of MAN UP and was able to make them aware of what Cruisin' for a Cure Buffalo would entail. They unanimously supported the concept.

Secondly, I was made even more aware of the many issues involved – genetic predispositions, regional disparities in diagnosis and treatment, dietary considerations, educational shortcomings and macho stereotypes being most significant.

Dr. James Mohler of Roswell Park spoke most eloquently on many of these issues and reinforced the facts – African-American men are 1.6 times as likely to be diagnosed with PCa and 2.5 times as likely to die from it. He suggested reasons for this, one of them being the interesting possibility that Vitamin D deficiencies are more common the farther from the equator people of African ancestry move. Hopefully further research in this area will lead to better treatments and preventative therapies.

I also witnessed a most interesting confrontation between Dr. Mohler and a representative of the American Cancer Society. Dr. Mohler had taken the ACS to task for its perceived rejection of Prostate Cancer screening. The ACS representative asked to rebut this and stated that the press has grossly distorted the ACS position. In reality, the ACS supports screening as long as the results are interpreted correctly, the patient is made aware of the alternatives and treatments are carefully designed. Since this is exactly Dr. Mohler's position, the two shook hands to the accompaniment of loud applause.

The event organizer, Thomas Farrington, is a survivor and author of two books on his personal experience, 'Battling the Killer Within' and 'Battling the Killer Within and Winning'. Mr. Farrington announced that PHEN, the Prostate Cancer Foundation, ZERO – The Project to End Prostate Cancer and the Black Barbershop Health Outreach Program had just signed an historic agreement to work together to increase awareness of Prostate Cancer in ALL men.

In addition to attending the Summit, I got to tour the Baltimore waterfront and parts of DC and Virginia, including the House of Representative and various government office buildings. It was an interesting experience for a Canadian, who avoids politics as much as possible, to be meeting with various New York State political figures to promote the cause of Prostate Cancer Awareness.

2010 Prostate Cancer Canada Network Annual Conference, September 22 - 25

Because of my commitment to attend Cruisin' for a Cure in California, I was only able to attend the first day and a half of this four-day event. I was struck by the enthusiasm, excitement and energy evident from the registration process right through my time there.

CEO Steve Jones and Vice President Helene Vassos continue to fulfill our hopes for Prostate Cancer Canada Network. They and their able staff produced a valuable event that showcases the potential of our new national organization.

We were introduced to the various activities being carried out by Prostate Cancer Canada on our behalf, including fund-raising, research, awareness and media coverage. Some of the high points for me:

As always, Aaron Bacher, the outgoing head of PCCN – Toronto served most ably as Master of Ceremonies and host.

W. Brett Wilson of Calgary, a survivor and one of the stars of CBC's Dragon's Den, was an outstanding keynote speaker on Wednesday night, describing his journey with great style and humour.

Dr. Robert Bristow, one of Brampton's all-time favourite speakers, provided a succinct medical update first thing Thursday morning.

Dr. Bristow was followed by Adam Garone, the founder of Movember, which funded the conference. Adam described the beginning of Movember in a pub in Australia and its development into a major worldwide fund-raising program for Prostate Cancer awareness.

Before I left on Thursday, we went through a Team Building Workshop led by Gerald McGroarty of Brandon Taylor Consulting. Gerald brought out some interesting ideas on branding our groups and ourselves that I intend to pursue.

Paul Henshall was able to spend the entire four days at the Conference while Morris Rambout took over from me for the last two days. Hopefully Paul and Morris will also provide their reactions to the conference. I suggest that we should try for a larger, better organized contingent next year.

Al Hutton was the delegate for the Oakville group, but he found the time to put together a great table display highlighting PCCN – Brampton's annual Golf Tournament and Cruisin' for a Cure Canada.

11th Annual Cruisin' for a Cure, Orange County Fairgrounds in Costa Mesa
